Ongoing Surveys and Consultations

- EC Consultation on Sustainable Textiles:
 - The Commission has just <u>published</u> a new initiative -Consultation on a Draft Act on Fertilising products technical update.
 - New EU rules have been adopted to cover various types of fertilising products (inorganic, organo-mineral and organic fertilisers, growing media, plant biostimulants etc.). They ensure that only those fertilising products that meet the efficiency and safety requirements can be sold freely across the EU.
 - Regulation 2019/1009 will apply from 16 July 2022. Its updated technical annexes will help EU countries and industry apply the rules.
 - The main changes that we distinguish as involving the waste management sector are related to Annex II: CMC 3(compost) and CMC 5 (digestate). Mainly CMCs 3 and 5 exclude from their input materials living or dead

organisms from the organic fraction of mixed municipal household waste. The objective of those provisions is to encourage the separate collection of waste in municipalities, by not providing opportunities for the use of mixed waste.

- SUP Directive Guidelines:

- We received the <u>latest version of the SUP directive</u> <u>guidelines</u>, which are currently at the late stage of preparation by the Commission. The current version, compared to the one of September, seems to have specified the types of plastics better:
 - in chapter 4 Specific Product Criteria, from page 10 onwards, there are detailed examples of what is included in the Directive
 - in the definition of "not chemically modified" at page 7-8 they specify to pay attention to the polymer structure changes during the manufacturing process: " Consequently, it is not sufficient to merely consider the difference between the ingoing and the final polymer. In the course of manufacturing materials such as viscose and cellophane (in these cases, reaction with carbon disulphide to form sodium cellulose xanthate), the natural polymer cellulose undergoes a deliberate modification. chemical Therefore. viscose and cellophane cannot be deemed to have remained 'unmodified', even though they may return to a cellulose structure by the end of the process. This means that viscose and cellophane (made from cellulose) are included in the Directive...."

Monitoring of EU Institutions

Life of EU institutions

- Today, the 5th of February, EP ENVI Committee is voting to adopt its own-initiative report entitled "<u>Towards a WTO-</u> <u>compatible EU carbon border adjustment mechanism</u>", which addresses the creation of a carbon border adjustment mechanism (CBAM) as proposed by the European Commission in its Communication on the European Green Deal.
 - This new mechanism would place a carbon price on imports of certain goods from outside the EU, in order to reduce the risk of 'carbon leakage' which would counteract Europe's efforts to become climate-neutral by 2050. The reports calls for the introduction of a CBAM as part of a broader Union industrial strategy, which should cover all imports of products and commodities covered by the EU ETS, including when embedded in intermediate or final products. It also addresses issues linked to the design and scope of a CBAM. The Commission plans to present its legislative proposal on the CBAM in the second quarter of the year.

This week's focus: new plastic waste entries

• PEAD has prepared a consolidated paper on the upcoming Correspondents' guidelines on the new plastic waste entriestaking into account the comments received from your side and following the discussions in Sub-Committee Shipments and Committee 2. A few clarifications have been introduced with regards to the object-based methodology. As requested under the informal consultation process, the paper will be sent to the Commission today COB.

- With regards to the paper drafted by PlasticRecyclersEurope (PRE) circulated on Wednesday that we were asked to co-sign, we have deemed it as not aligning with the current FEAD message on the matter (especially with regards to "pre-treatment" and certification).
- Please, continue to send us any updates on Member States' position, as to follow the process in an integrated manner. We will keep you updated on how negotiations progress.

Press Review & Reports

- New EEA briefing Digital technologies will deliver more efficient waste management in Europe
 - 03 • On February, the European Environment Agency published a briefing entitled "Digital technologies will deliver more efficient waste management in **Europe**": "Digitalisation is transforming the 21st century, affecting every area of daily life, including the environmental technology sector. Digital technologies will deliver more effective waste management regimes. They will allow Europe's economy to recover more of the valuable materials present in waste streams, reducing the amounts of raw materials mined or imported and avoiding the associated environmental and climate impacts."
 - The briefing is based on the underpinning <u>report by the</u> <u>European Topic Centre on Waste and Materials in a</u> <u>Green Economy</u> (ETC/WMGE).
- <u>New EEA briefing</u> <u>Designing safe and sustainable products</u> requires a new approach for chemicals
 - On 04 February, the European Environment Agency published a briefing entitled "<u>Designing safe and</u> <u>sustainable products requires a new approach for</u> <u>chemicals</u>": "The EU chemicals strategy for sustainability aims to ensure that chemicals are 'produced and used in a way that maximises their contribution to society while avoiding harm to the planet and to current and future

generations' (EC, 2020). Building sustainability dimensions into products' design phase can support the delivery of these objectives. Key features of sustainable products include chemical safety, recyclability and a low environmental impact. This briefing describes approaches that are safe and sustainable by design and identifies enabling conditions, which support their uptake, and the related challenges and opportunities."

<u>New EEA report & briefings on plastics and the circular</u> <u>economy</u>

- The European Environment Agency has just published a new report entitled "<u>Plastics, the circular economy and</u> <u>Europe's environment — A priority for action</u>".
 - Plastics play an essential role in modern society, but also lead to significant impacts on the environment and climate. Reducing such impacts while retaining the usefulness of plastics requires a shift towards a more circular and sustainable plastics system. This report tells the story of plastics, and their effect on the environment and climate, and looks at their place in a European circular economy.
 - The EEA report points to three pathways for the way ahead including smarter use of plastics, increased circularity, and use of renewable raw materials. Together these can help ensure we achieve a sustainable and circular plastics system.
